
years, I can say that the reward for the investment of your time is well worth it.



CLAIRE MELIA MAKES HISTORY

Ireland international Claire Melia has become the first Irish woman to pick up a European club medal, but her side Baxi Ferrol were unable to overturn a four-point deficit in the second leg of the FIBA Women's Euro Cup Final.

The Spanish outfit lost out 84-70 on the night and 162-145 on aggregate against Villeneuve d'Ascq LM of France in Lille, capping a historic first season for Melia in Galacia with a silver medal.

The 25 year-old adds a FIBA Women's Euro Cup medal to a cabinet that already contains two FIBA Youth EuroBasket medals, as well as every domestic honour in Irish basketball.

The home side showed no signs of nerves early, racing into a 7-0 lead before Baxi Ferrol could respond – Moira

Joiner draining a three following a pass from Melia, her first of four assists in total on the evening. Her first points came with 3:26 remaining in the quarter, a driving layup reducing the arrears on the night to five, 17-12.

Two more assists would follow before the end of the first, Julie Pospisilova the beneficiary on both occasions as the Spanish side - who had come through the qualifiers to earn a spot in the tournament back in September - fought to keep their dream clive.

Backed by a sold out arena in Lille, Villeneuve d'Ascq were not going to be denied in their bid to win a second FIBA Women's Euro Cup though. This success arriving a decade on from when they first raised the trophy and they duly found their range superbly in the second and early in the third to put the tie to bed.

When Melia next found the basket with 6:55 to go in that third period, the score had reached 51-37 and Ferrol now needed to outscore their opponents by 18 in the closing stages if they were to pull off the miracle within the miracle. It was not to be.

Melia's final points of her European season came just under two minutes later, as she got to work beneath the basket in what has been a staple of this European journey. One more assist followed to Angela Mataix for a pull up jump shot with 8:20 remaining, but Meila and the Ferrol faithful will have to settle for a silver ending to a fairytale campaian.

Speaking afterwards, Melia said: "We thought we'd be closer to them, but they played very well today. They couldn't miss and they played well as a team on defense all around the court. Look, we never thought we'd be here and now we have a silver medal, so it's not too bad. Maybe someone else will be over here or someday, everyone has their own journey. You never know what can happen, but always remember there's more to life than basketball.

An unbeaten season is on the line, as well as promotion in the Domino's Women's Division One Final. McEvoy's Cavan Eagles have enjoyed a 21-0 record in league and National Cup this season, but that'll all be for nought if they can't extend that run against Limerick Celtics when it counts.

This will be the fourth meeting between the two sides this campaign, with McEvoy's Cavan Eagles coming out on top on all three previous occasions. The closest tie though was the Women's Division One National Cup semi-final in Cork in January, where Limerick Celtics got within four points of their rivals in defence of their title.

The matchup between Stephanie McBride and Shelby Harmeyer of Limerick Celtics and Rahmena Henderson and Lanetta Williams is sure to prove crucial, but the team that receives the biggest contributions from their Irish core is likely to come out on top. Emma, Ciara and Niamh Tolan have all enioved excellent seasons, but so have Sabhbh Edwards-Murphy and Jessica Scannell of Limerick Celtics.

"Honestly, just winning like that, we want to experience that feeling again," said McEvoy's Cavan Eagles Lanetta Williams, looking back on

their National Cup title success in January. "I just know that we can do it again if we're working all together as a team and you know that's what we go for, to win every game in that way and just aet better as we do it."

"We're just taking it one game at a time still," she says quickly when the unbeaten season is brought up. "Every game is different and so all we can do is try to win every battle individually and as a team, do the best we can and hopefully show out for the fans and win."

The two teams figure to be closely matched in the paint and Williams is well aware that a physical showdown awaits on Saturday afternoon. "They're a areat team. They have everything they need in every spot to be successful against any team in this league, so I really believe this is going to be a great game. It's going to come down to which team can play harder and make shots. so hopefully that's going to be us when it's all said and done," added Williams.

Kev Players

Rahmena Henderson, Lanetta Williams and Emma Tolan have all been decisive factors at different points this season, but it is Henderson, who was selected to the Domino's Women's Division One All-Star First Team that will be expected to be the main offensive threat for McEvoy's Cavan Eagles. Henderson is averaging 21.6 points and 9.4 boards with an efficiency rating of 23. She's also above the league average from the free-throw line at 78%.

Limerick Celtics' Stephanie McBride and Shelby Harmeyer both earned selections to the All-Star first team for their consistency this season. McBride finished 3rd in the league in scoring with Harmeyer 5th, so both are capable of taking a game over. McBride is also phenomenal on the offensive glass and her coaching team will be asking her to steal a few extra possessions at the National Basketball Arena on Saturday evening.

The Domino's Men's Division One Final pits the two most complete teams in the league against one another for the third time this season, with the ultimate prize of promotion on the line.

Limerick Celtics have come out on top on both previous occasions they faced ND Audit Portlaoise Panthers, most notably a 72-60 success when both sides met as unbeaten teams in the Presidents' National Cup Final at the National Basketball Arena in January.

"We've been looking forward to this rematch since losing in the cup." said ND Audit Portlaoise Panthers forward Xabi Arriaga ahead of the game. "We knew that if we made it to the championship game, it would be against Limerick Celtics."

On what they can do to change the outcome, Arriaga is preaching a closer attention to two players defensively.

"I think we know that we need to focus more on Finn (Hughes) and Ariyon (Williams) - they've been the best players in the league for them - but also having Abdul (Wurie) and Chima (Obikwelu) as the big guys, it makes it a very tough matchup. We will definitely be doing something differently though because we lost the last two games against them so we have to."

"We've definitely gotten better

(since the loss to Limerick Celtics three months ago), we're playing better basketball offensively and defensively, so hopefully that will lead to a different outcome on Saturday night."

Both clubs are known as great family environments, something reflected immediately by Limerick Celtics Abdul Wurie. "It's my first finals in a long time, so I'm really looking forward to it. My family are coming over from London to watch, which makes it even more exciting for me."

Prior to the men taking the court, Limerick Celtis women will compete for the Domino's Women's Division One title. Wurie is proud of what the club have been able to achieve in both competitions this season.

"It's been a special season for both the men and women's team," said Wurie. "It'd be crazy if both teams could reach the Super League next

season."

Celtics have been near impossible to stop for the majority of sides. averaging 98 points per game with a league high offensive efficiency rating of 109.5. Ariyon Williams, Finn Hughes and Wurie have struck up a areat connection, but what does he put that chemistry down to?

"We train every day so just knowing what one another is going to do, knowing that we are all going to work hard on both ends of the floor and just getting on with one another outside of the court too. It really

"We're 2-0 against Portlaoise this season," emphasises Wurie when asked about their opponents on Saturday. We won't be getting carried away though. We know what we have to do and just how hard we'll need to work defensively if we want to take the win for the Limerick Celtic fans. The whole community has been great all season so looking forward to hearing their support again one more time."



It's a tale of contrasting traditions in the Domino's Women's Super League final at the National Basketball Arena on Sunday afternoon.

Killester – bidding to become the second team in 15 years to defend their title and aiming for their third trophy in 18 months – against Utility Trust St. Paul's – the team from Killarney competing in their first top tier national final at senior level. St. Paul's will also become the first team to get promoted and win the Domino's Women's Super League in the following season should they hoist the trophy aloft at roughly 16:15 on TG4.

The tale of the tape suggests a tight battle on the horizon. This is the third time the sides have met this season, with the highest margin of victory five points and the record currently standing at 2-1 in favour of the Dubliners.

Utility Trust St. Paul's will feel as if they owe Killester. Mark Grennell's side rallied from nine points down to reach the Paudie O'Connor Cup final at the expense of Sunday's opponents back in January, but St. Paul's captain Denise Dunlea insists they'll play without fear come Sunday.

"Quietly confident, to be honest," she said during Tuesday's National League finals media day. "We're going in without fear. That's what we've done in our last two games because we're in bonus territory having just come up from division one last year. We're just delighted to be here and hopefully we can put in another good performance for our supporters this weekend."

In Dunlea, Lynn Jones and Rheanne O'Shea – head coach James Fleming has players who don't feel as if they're just representing themselves or their club, Dunlea says they are representing all of Kerry basketball this weekend.

"It's massive for the likes of Lynn that she came come up here almost 20 years on from playing in her previous final, with her three young children and have that experience. I mean it's the whole community in Kerry as well you know there's a few supporters buses coming, so fingers crossed we can get a result on the day for the people of Killarney and Kerry."

Standing opposite Dunlea will be Irish international Hannah Thornton, who made the move from DCU Mercy to play with Killester this season and has enjoyed the introduction of

the playoff system to the Domino's Women's Super League this season.

"I think it's brought an extra kind of fight and an exciting finish to the season," she said. "It's about not peaking too early at the start of the season and I feel as if we are peaking at the right time now and hopefully

that's how it works out for us." Killester vanquished a few demons by defeating their Paudie O'Connor Cup final conquerors FloMAX Liffey Celtics in the last four to reach this stage and Thornton indicated that the victory did mean just a little more than usual.

"We were still hurting from the cup final in the semi-final two weeks ago, but we knew what we had to do to try and get the win and we managed to play really well as a team, there was a really big support behind us from Killester and it was a fantastic feeling to get that win."

The 33-year-old isn't buying into Utility Trust St. Paul's underdog status too much, however.

It's been a decade since either UCC Demons or Killester have etched their name on the Domino's Men's Super League trophy. One of those droughts will end on Sunday evening live on TG4 at the National Basketball Arena.

This is a rivalry that has been building throughout the season, with the last instalment a chippy affair in the Mardyke Arena shortly after Killester lifted the Pat Duffy National Cup at the expense of UCC Demons earlier this year. Demons had the last laugh on that occasion in a 108-96 win in front of their home fans, but reversing January's final defeat with silverware on the line would be much sweeter.

"People definitely play differently with more pressure." believes UCC Demos guard Patrick Robinson, who joined the team at the start of December. "That's why playoff basketball suits us as a team though, because we have practiced those critical situations which allows us to come out on top."

Robinson was this week named to the Domino's Men's Super Legaue All-Star first team, along with team mate Elijah Tillman, whom Robinson is very thankful to be playing with.

"He's a big, big help down the stretch in games. Even if we're struggling to get him the ball during the game, when it's crunch time and we find a way to give him the ball, he's likely to get fouled and that freethrow is almost always going in."

The College of Charleston graduate isn't wrong. Tillman is averaging 22.5 points this season, including a whopping 69.8% from inside the arc and 75.7% from the foul line as the North Cork side bid for their ninth league success.

"I'm sure we're going to pick it up where we left off." Robinson adds with a smile when the subject of tension between the teams is raised. "Both teams are hungry, both teams are well coached. This is the number one versus the number two team in the league playing for a championship, that's always exciting to be a part of."

Kason Harrell's fourth season as a Killester player couldn't be going much better. The Pittsburgh guard picked up the MVP award in the Pat Duffy National Cup final and joins Tillman, Robinson and his teammate Paul Dick on the Domino's Men's Super League All-Star First Team.

One of his biggest disappointments in orange and black came at this stage last season though, when he was unable to lead Killester past Griffith College Éanna in the decider.

"Jonny's probably not going to like me saying this, but that game has been on my mind since April of last year," Harrell began. "It's definitely a big reason why I wanted to come back, to try and get to this stage again and I'm just thanking God that I've been afforded this opportunity to be back here just one year later."

Having started the year 13-2, the club were hit by an injury to Irish international Paul Dick in January. Harrell is delighted to have him back close to full fitness ahead of the final on Sunday.

"Anytime you lose one of the best players in the country, you're going to struagle. Paul is amazing not only as a player, but as a teammate, so him going down like that definitely added a little bit of struggle to the regular season and we dropped a couple of games, but one thing about our team is that we stay together, stay resilient and when he did come back, we were able to pick up where we left off."

This is aging to be a war on Sunday." continued Harrell. "We were able to get them in the cup and I know they took that very personally as defending champions, so we knew going into the Mardyke (in the legaue the following month) that it was going to be intense and it surpassed expectations."

"Meeting them again for another trophy is going to be 40-minutes of all out war. I think the fans can expect a really good game from both teams and at the end of it, I believe the best team will come out on top," he added.

If that team is Killester, it'll be the first championship for the team since the 2013/14 season and the perfect conclusion to Harrell's four year journey to the top of the mountain in North Dublin.


